Students will listen to wonderful selections of classic children's literature and respond through engaging hands-on activities. We are committed to developing the whole child by providing a pleasant environment for children to take chances and explore. Above all, we strive to lead children to taste the joys of being a child of God and grow in their understanding of serving Him.

Christian Education: In Junior Kindergarten Bible class, the overarching theme is God's care and love for His people. The Old Testament stories introduce students to biblical characters in a way that shows how God displays His love and takes care of each person. This month, topics include:

- Jesus visits the Temple
- Jesus and Nicodemus
- Jesus chooses His disciples
- Jesus blesses the children
- Jesus' talk with a Samaritan woman
- Memory Verses: John 3:16-17 "For God so loved the world, that He gave his only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved." (ESV)

Language Arts: This month, Junior Kindergarten students will listen to stories and complete activities associated with the themes 100 days of school, Valentine's Day, and body parts (head, shoulders, knees, toes, eyes, ears, mouth, and nose). Using songs, chants, and stories, students will develop phonics skills as they practice hearing, recognizing, and saying letters and their sounds. With the use of various tactile means, students will have opportunities to develop their fine motor skills and practice proper letter formation. This month, skills include:

- Phonics: /sh/, /aw/, /kw/, /oi/, /ks/, long u, /oo/, /ow/ sounds
- Beginning and/or ending sounds of the following phonograms found in words: /sh/, /aw/, /kw/, /oi/, /ks/, long u, /oo/, /ow/
- Identifying the number of syllables in words
- Journal writing: printing the letters Aa, Bb, Cc, Dd, Ee, Ff, Gg, Hh, Ii, Jj, Kk, Ll, Mm, Nn, Oo independently

World Cultures and Geography: As we continue our tour of the world, students will learn about Canada and the United States of America. Students will:

- Learn about the Inuit living in the Arctic
- Learn about Canadian winter sports
- Locate Canada and America on a map
- Know that Canada is the second largest country in the world
- Know that Canada and America are located in the continent of North America
- Recognize that people in Canada speak English and French
- Learn about the Quebec Winter Carnival
- Learn about Christopher Columbus, the Wright Brothers, and the Statue of Liberty

Mathematics: Junior kindergarten mathematics emphasizes the use of manipulatives and concrete materials to enable students to explore and develop ideas fundamental to the study of mathematics. This month, students will learn about:

- Measuring, comparing, and ordering height
- Measuring and comparing capacity

JK – The Grammar Stage

Innova Academy's grammar school curriculum builds a solid academic foundation, emphasizing mastery of facts and fundamental skills. Grammar stage students have the natural ability to retain large amounts of information, so Innova intentionally builds knowledge across the curriculum immersing students in a holistic, unified, and rich learning experience. Students are actively engaged in learning while applying skills they have previously acquired to new, expansive content. Classrooms are filled with singing, chanting, movement, and engaging hands-on activities. Strong habits of heart, mind, and soul are reinforced, as students become more aware of their impact on others and build skills in self-governance and responsibility.

- Measuring using non-standard materials
- Recognizing standard measurement tools
- Estimating and collecting data
- Numbers 10-19 and sets of 10

Science: This month in science, students will explore body parts, nutrition, colours and light. Students will learn the French words for head, shoulders, knees, toes, eyes, ears, mouth, and nose through the Head and Shoulders song. They will also do various hands-on activities and experiments such as the balloon lung experiment, the sugar experiment, the exploding colours in milk experiment, the walking water colour and light experiments to learn about:

- Body systems muscular, digestive, nervous, respiratory, circulatory
- Healthy eating
- How colours are made
- Light and its source

Visual Arts: This year, students are learning about cultural art from around the world. This month's artwork will showcase the continent of North America. Projects will include the following:

- Native Canadian art using the colours blue, red, green, and black
- Valentine's Day art project
- Create a body made from shapes

Music: In music class, Junior Kindergarten students will begin to work with unpitched percussion and continue to practice their skills singing. This month, there will be a stronger emphasis on pitch matching, keeping a steady pulse, and understanding rhythmic notation. More specifically, we will explore:

- Good singing tone and correct pitch matching
- Half notes and half rests
- Rhythmic patterns on unpitched percussion instruments

Physical Education: During physical education time, students will have opportunities to develop spatial awareness, balance, and coordination using their bodies and a variety of equipment. Throughout the year, students are led to develop good sportsmanship while playing games with their classmates. This month's focus includes:

- Kicking
- Beanbag dribbling with feet
- Ball kicking variations
- Kicking to a target

Please note that although students in different grades often study the same topic, curricular expectations are tailored to individual grade levels.
