Grade 5 and

Grade 5 students have opportunities to show marked maturity academically and spiritually as they learn to make meaningful connections and critically analyze ideas. Teachers continue to foster the love of learning, and lead students to deepen their understanding of God's purpose for His creation and their role in His redemptive plan.

Christian Education: This month, students will begin to study The Sermon on the Mount. Students will:

- Understand the setting and the crowds of the Sermon on the Mount
- Examine the eight beatitudes that distinguish followers of Jesus
- Learn what it means to be the salt and light of the world
- Understand what it means to seek God and His kingdom first and above all else
- Discuss obedience from the heart and not just in action
- Memorize 1 John 4:7-17

Literature and Writing: This month, students will begin studying the classic novel, *Treasure Island*, by Robert Louis Stevenson. Students will:

- Learn about the life of Robert Louis Stevenson
- Explore the historical backdrop of the novel
- Master vocabulary from the novel
- Discuss and memorize quotes from the novel
- Analyze and discuss plot development, characterization, literary elements, and biblical application
- Contribute meaningfully to group discussions by explaining ideas, building upon others' comments, and asking questions
- Understand the structure and style of a newspaper article and write an article
- Write passages of the book from dictation, observing proper structure, spelling, and punctuation

Spelling: Using the *Spell to Write and Read* program, students develop spelling skills through word analysis and understanding and applying spelling rules to daily writing across the curriculum. This month, students will:

- Review and apply spelling rules
- Analyze weekly spelling words drawn from the class list and student writing
- Write well-constructed sentences to practice grammar skills and illustrate the meaning of weekly spelling words

Grammar: Grammar study develops students' awareness and understanding of how the English language is structured. As students work through the grammar program, they apply their knowledge to writing in all subject areas. This month's grammar study will focus on verbs. Students will:

- Identify main verbs and helping verbs
- Understand and identify linking verbs
- Identify predicate adjectives and predicate nouns
- Understand subject-verb agreement
- Diagram sentences

Latin and Greek Vocabulary: Students will strengthen their vocabulary through the study of Latin and Greek. Students develop the ability to analyze unfamiliar English words based on Latin and Greek prefixes, suffixes, and roots. Students will:

- Learn English derivatives related to the Latin word *plur* (more)
- Learn English derivatives related to the Greek word *bio* (life), *photo* (light), *phil* (love), *multi/poly* (many), and *mega* (large, million, great)

French: This month, students will finish the play "Boucles Violettes" and present it in class. Students will:

- Work towards speaking exclusively in French
- Memorize their lines for "Boucles Violettes"
- Work on writing and comprehension activities

Grade 5 – The Logic Stage

The strong knowledge base established in the grammar school provides a solid foundation as students enter the logic school. As perspective widens, students start to make meaningful connections across the curriculum. Students show more independence in their learning and establish systems in self-regulation and personal study skills. Shaping students' habits of heart, mind, and soul is a key focus as students deepen their understanding of God's purpose for his creation and their role in his redemptive plan. Teachers continue to foster the love of learning, and students have opportunities to show marked maturity academically and spiritually as they learn to critically analyze ideas and speak to issues in light of God's purposes.

- Complete the memorization of the sixth gospel statement
- Learn 11 expressions that use the verb avoir

History/Geography: This year, students will delve into world history spanning 1500 to 1800. Topics discussed this month include:

- Louis XIV – The Sun King
- Frederick – the first Prussian king
- King Philip's War
- William Penn
- The King's Daughters
- John Newton and John Locke
- Peter the Great

Mathematics: In mathematics, students will complete a unit on angles and a unit on triangles and four-sided figures. Students will also begin to study three-dimensional shapes. Topics studied this month include:

- Angles on a line
- Classifying triangles (right, isosceles, and equilateral)
- Properties of parallelograms, trapezoids, and rhombuses

Science: Students will continue their investigation of motion by building DC motor cars with gears. They will then start a unit on plants and forestry and investigate the following:

- Structure of plants
- Identification of plants
- Function and importance of plants

Visual Arts: Students will study Baroque art and create a still life painting inspired by Caravaggio. Students will also create a sculpture in kiln-fired clay then paint their pottery with ceramic glazes. Skills focused on will include:

- Painting and colour mixing
- 3-dimensional sculpture
- Form and texture

Music: Grade 5 students are busy preparing for the spring musical. As they rehearse for their performance, students will continue to develop musical skills in the following areas:

- Singing in tune with good tone quality
- Singing in unison and 2-part harmony
- Observing dynamics, articulation, proper enunciation, and vowel control
- Following the conductor and working as an ensemble

Physical Education: This month, students will begin preparing for the track and field meet by training and practicing for their chosen events. In addition, we will discuss different energy systems (aerobic vs. anaerobic) used in these events and how our physiology can adapt with proper training. We will explore various techniques and strategies for the following types of events:

- Throwing events
- Jumping events
- Running events (distance vs. sprints)

Please note that although students in different grades often study the same topic, curricular expectations are tailored to individual grade levels.
